




Orientation program of Batch 2021-2023

Independence Day



Zydus Cadila: India approves world's first DNA Covid vaccine

India's drug regulator has approved the world's first DNA vaccine ZyCov-D against Covid-19 for emergency use. This is the world's first human DNA vaccine against Covid-19. ZyCov-D is also India's first needle-free Covid-19 jab. It is administered with a disposable needle-free injector, which uses a narrow stream of the fluid to penetrate the skin and deliver the jab to the proper tissue. Cadila Healthcare said, that it had conducted the largest clinical trial for the vaccine in India so far, involving 28,000 volunteers in more than 50 centres.



Can this quote hold true for Mental Health as well?

We are well versed with the fact that our climate is changing unequivocally, and researchers are trying to understand the pattern since 1970's. Our climate does not act as a linear system but rather as a complex system, characterized by regime oscillations. shifts. and chaotic fluctuations in all timescales. that SO predictions are impervious. Climate will change




inevitably impose alterations in our lifestyles and consequences in terms of human losses and social readjustments. Studies have witnessed that the extreme (can be defined as the rare and outside the normal range) climate events like climate change related water disaster (CCRWD), heat waves, droughts, wildfires, winter storms, extreme storms, etc. have a long-term effect on mental health. However, it is not clear how many people on the planet will be affected by extreme phenomena caused by climate change, and to what extent and when these phenomena will compromise the quality of their life. As a part of fact, it is clear that people are at risk for their survival, either directly (during, for example, an extreme event) or indirectly (reduction of food, famine, water scarcity, decrease in places to cultivate or hunt, displacement), that can lead to immediate/short term mental disorders like stress, behavioral changes, mood irritability, etc. Climate change will also exert the greatest impact on groups of vulnerable populations that therefore have an increased probability of developing psychopathologies: women, the elderly, children, people with previous psychiatric illnesses whose mental condition can consequently worsen, people with low income or poor social network, migrants, as well as indigenous and native communities. Research shows that greenery can have a positive effect on the rehabilitative health of the elderly population. Moreover, availability of green areas and parks in childhood has a preventive effect on the risk of developing various mental disorders later in life and aid good cognitive development. Collectively, this systematic review suggests that events like flood, tornadoes, heatwaves, thunderstorms, droughts, pollution and global warming can lead to the damage of property, resources and life. It has been recorded that this devastation can lead to mental issues and also increases the risk of suicide in the population. Researchers have found that majority of the extreme weather events can lead to the mental disorders like PTSD, depression, anxiety (now termed 'Ecoanxiety') in its long-term effects. Many authors suggested that even if the long term and short-term effects are not seen, climate change is one of the factors responsible for meteorosenstivity (development of a specific illness or the worsening of an existing disease as a consequence of climatic changes) which is a point of concern.

Being able to understand what this change entails, we urge powerholders to design early interventions and plan of action for a population's mental health. As responsible human beings we should support the people who are more sensitive to weather and atmospheric phenomena as they may be more affected by gradually occurring global climate changes and their consequences, such as global warming, rising sea levels, landscape changes, and loss of familiar environmental landmarks. According to the author, all of these issues need to be more extensively studied and clinical experience should be gained in order to support provisional conclusions. The challenge of climate change will be protracted in the upcoming years. Therefore, this branch of "ecopsychiatry" will surely be supported by new data sets and further studies.

Social Marketing

"Do boond Zindagi ki" these words in the heavy voice of Amitabh Bachchan was one of the reasons India became Polio free. Similarly, many such campaigns were carried out to bring awareness among the population regarding AIDS control, tuberculosis, family planning, maternal and child health, road safety, tobacco and smoking etc. These campaigns were immensely successful, and the results are tangible. Such campaigns that combine the principles of marketing and social sciences to achieve a socially desirable goal, that benefits the society as a whole is termed social marketing.

As Andreasen defines social marketing in his book named Marketing the social change "the application of proven concepts and techniques drawn from the commercial sector to promote changes in diverse socially important behaviour such as drug use, smoking, sexual behaviour. This marketing approach has an immense potential to affect major social problems if we can only learn how to harness its power"

Social marketing is a systematic process consisting of 6 well-planned steps namely, getting started, scope, develop, implement, evaluate, and follow up. It is based on how people behave and changing that behaviour rather than just creating awareness. Social marketing is based on 4 key elements i.e.,

4Ps of social marketing- (Product, Price, Place and Promotion)

Product; signifies the desired social behaviour

Price is the difficulty, time & emotional cost to attain a given goal, hence it should be minimum place

Place signifies where you want your audience to perform the desired behaviour.

Promotion includes PR, advertising on the channels to reach out to the target audience.

Social marketing provides actions and policies based on understanding the community's beliefs and perceptions, thereby delivering the goals and policy to fit people's needs. In the above examples, it is clear that social marketing is widely used for attaining healthcare goals by bringing about behavioral change in society. To

achieve this social marketing uses strategies like mass communication, interpersonal communication, a promotion at health clinics, educational institutes, community outreach etc.

In the ongoing pandemic, social marketing strategies are widely used to bring about necessary changes about social distancing, wearing masks and maintaining personal hygiene. It is also used to enhance the vaccination uptake to curb the pandemic. Hence it can be concluded that social marketing is essential in healthcare, sometimes it can serve as a primordial mode of prevention.
